I am currently a second-year Anatomic Pathology Resident at the University of Georgia in a combined PhD program. I received my DVM from Colorado State University in May 2012. During my time in veterinary school, I worked in Dr. Michael Lappin's laboratory working with bloodborne, enteric and respiratory pathogens in companion animals. After graduating veterinary school, I spent 14 months in practice as a small animal emergency and general practice veterinarian with Rohan and Harper, PC in Buffalo, NY, before starting my residency in July 2013.
